Our church was radically changed in St Johns day, to where we find ourselves today. Let us all have a humble and open heart and prepare to receive the Lord in Word and Eucharist.

We wish our Headteacher and whole school staff a restful time away from the school. I know how difficult it has been for them. Go with our prayers for all you do for our parish children.

I will continue to keep you and your families in my prayers while celebrating the Mass.

Reflection by Tony Topping

THE DARNEL

Over the last few months, I have noticed how good and generous people are; and how caring and brave they are. At the same time, I have become aware of how much evil is in the world. It would not be difficult to imagine that God is punishing us for allowing the world to become so corrupt, but I do not believe that God punishes us for He is a kind and gentle father, not one who abuses his children and cruelly punishes them for every misdeed. The first reading on Sunday is taken from the book of Wisdom and tells us that God does not judge unjustly, that He is lenient and ever ready to forgive.

God creates! He does not destroy the good things that he has created. It is the enemies of God who destroy and corrupt. The devil works in insidious ways making people think that killing and destroying is the answer to many of our problems; the end justifying the means; killing the unborn and euthanasia is simply being cruel to be kind; suppressing the poor and taking advantage of the week; intolerance toward people of colour or of a different religion; supplying arms to corrupt governments, building weapons of mass destruction, these are but a few of the ways the devil is using people to destroy the world.

In the Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the darnel in the field where the good seed has been sown. Later in that passage, Jesus explains to his disciples, the meaning of the parable. He said the sower of the good seed is himself, the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom; the darnel, the subjects of the evil one; the enemy who sowed them, the devil. Darnel is a poisonous weed that is very difficult to identify. I believe that most people are good at heart but the devil has many helpers who are constantly trying to distort the word of God and corrupt the minds of those who try to follow it. Like the good seed we live with good and bad people around us. It is very often difficult recognise the difference and it is not for us to judge who is good and who is bad. Those who do the devil's work often think that they are working for God. Even St. Paul, before his conversion believed he was doing right by persecuting the followers of Christ We must be constantly aware of the danger. I pray every day that God, The Father, will keep us free from temptation and deliver us from all evil.

I think the younger generation are more aware of the evils in our world and are prepared to fight against them. I admire their stand against racism and as long as it remains non-violent, I will try to support it in any way I can.

Tony Topping has sent through this poem - it is said every day before mass at Walsingham. It is a lovely prayer for those who cannot go to mass.

It has found new life and can be used to associate yourself with the mass offered in your parish that day, perhaps, saying it at the time you know mass is being celebrated, but it can be said at any time.

Dear Guardian Angel,

go for me to the church, there kneel down at the mass for me. At the offertory, take me to God and offer him my service; What I am, what I have I offer as my gift. At the consecration, with your seraphic strength, Adore my saviour truly present, Praying for those who have loved me' For those who have offended me And for those who are now deceased, That the blood of Jesus may purify them all. During communion, bring me the Body and Blood of Jesus, Uniting Him with me in spirit So that my heart may become his dwelling place. Plead with him, that through his sacrifice, All people throughout the world may be saved. When the mass ends, bring home to me and to every home, The Lord's blessing. Amen.
