Please remember in your prayers the family of David Williams who was 79 and died a week last Monday. David had a huge impact on the spirituality of SVP and was an inspiration too many and best summed up in a letter from his daughter about his life and dedication to the SVP. For many years David played the music at St Winefride's SVP Christmas Lunch and was well known to many of our parishioners. A man who battled cancer twice in his life died just one week after developing symptoms of the coronavirus.

His daughter wrote; there won't be a funeral at this time of crisis, but we will hold a memorial Mass and celebration of his life at some point in the future. In the meantime, if you would like to do something in Dad's memory, please no flowers, please donate to the SVP. Dad was a faithful and dedicated member of the Saint Vincent De Paul Society from the age of 16 until today, serving at several levels, from visiting local elderly and isolated people every week, to consulting on, writing and advising all 135 countries on the International Rule, (the legal operational and spiritual constitution of the international society). Sometimes even in his 70s, he would work through the night on his computer, and, when I asked him why he hadn't gone to bed, he would respond, "I just needed to get this back to Burkina Faso" or "I just needed to 're-write this letter from Saint Paul". Dad loved thinking writing. He wrote the book "The Mind And Heart of a Vincentian" and was working on a new edition.

Dad early-retired from the Royal Insurance at 51 and dedicated himself to the SVP.

As well as all the work on the Rule and his book, in his 60s he was the only lay person in a Vatican/SVP mission to China, during which he carried letters to a Bishop who had been imprisoned 28 years by the regime, and his group had to change their itinerary daily to stay one step ahead of the Secret Police, who pursued them everywhere they went. Last year he went to Rome to work with the Vatican lawyers to renegotiate the SVP 's legal relationship with the Roman Catholic Church vs Pope Francis' reforms. Dad believed in a universal God and fought to retain the membership of people of all faiths and none in the SVP, and the service to people of all faiths, and none, by the SVP.

Dad had a special regard for the Ba'hai and wrote a British Ba'hai wedding service. In India Dad will be remembered by our community in Kolkata every time my Brother Arindam sings Catholic hymns at Hindu pujas and parties - he learned them all from an iPod Dad gave him. Dad will be remembered by his friends worldwide for his hard work, his thoughtfulness, his fun cringy jokes, his brilliant piano playing and many lovely singalongs, through which he helped to raise thousands for charity, and which brought us all so much pleasure. Dad was passionate in his interests, an avid reader and intellectual, collector of theological books, of music, of films.

Along with David Williams can we also pray for the families of Marie Jones, sister to Agnes, Nora and Rosalie and John Christopher Holden the late husband of Patricia who have also just recently passed away.

A message from the Bishop to the people of the Diocese during the public health crisis, 26th April 2020



I send this short message to you as we continue to walk day by day through this crisis. I know that tens of thousands have been able to join me in the Cathedral via livestream, yet I am conscious that I have not been able to speak personally to many others in the Diocese. I want to assure you, whether you find yourself today in our hospitals and care homes; in self isolation at home; or living amidst the many restrictions of this time, that we remain united in prayer.

Be assured that you have a place in my prayer every day. I particularly want to thank your priests and deacons who have continued to serve in so many generous ways, not least in the care of the sick and dying and above all by the daily offering of the Mass celebrated alone. I know you are held in their daily prayer. I also want to record our gratitude at this moment in history to all the doctors, nurses, care workers, cleaners, our police and shop workers and all of the essential services together with so many volunteers. I know many others are praying and interceding hidden from human sight. Pope Francis reminds us, it is all of you who are quietly and heroically writing the story of this time. In the Gospel, we hear how even in the most desolate and bewildering moments, the Risen Jesus walks with us even when we fail to recognise Him. He allows our hearts to once more burn within us and inspires the prayer, "Stay with us, Lord Jesus." I hope the re-opening of our churches will not be too long delayed so that we can recognise Jesus Himself as the first disciples recognised Him in the breaking of the bread – in the mystery of the Holy Eucharist with all joy renewed. In the meantime, let us continue to pray wherever we find ourselves: Stay with us, Lord Jesus as we walk through these days. May God bless you and all your loved ones,

THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM TONY TOPPING "CONFUSION"

If we Christians are what we should be, we will set this world on fire, st. Catherine of Sienna

As Cleopas and his companion walked along the road to Emmaus, they felt confused and angry. All their hopes and expectations were shattered. How could this happen? Why did it happen? They were so disappointed. They felt let down. They were angry with God, why did he let it happen? What had they done to deserve this? Most of all they were angry with Jesus. They had given up everything for him because they believed him; they believed that he was the Christ, that he would save and deliver Israel, yet he gave in without a word. He did nothing to defend himself. He could have roused the people to revolt against his arrest. Pilate would have taken notice; he would have released him but Jesus said nothing. The disciples did not understand and were annoyed when this stranger approached them, how did he not know what had been happening in Jerusalem yet they told him all about it and the stranger listened.

The other evening, I watched a drama on television, I should say half watched as I was doing something else while it was on; I can't even remember the title of the drama, but I think I got the idea of it. It was about a man who was left a diary in the will of someone he knew thirty years previous. He remembered clearly all that went on in his life at that time. As he delved further and talked to others who were around at that time, he realised that his memory of events did not correspond with theirs. When he learned the truth, he became a changed man. I think the idea behind the story is that the way we interpret the past is influenced by how we are in the present.

We only see an event from the perspective of the role we played in it. It is only when we hear other interpretations of the event that we begin to understand it from a broader perspective.

The disciples were bewildered yet this stranger who spoke so eloquently and so knowledgably about the scriptures made them feel the way they had when they first met Jesus. The fire in their hearts was rekindled. The stranger gently reproached them for their lack of understanding and began to explain to them all the passages in the scriptures which were relevant to what had been going on over the last few days. They were so fired up they insisted that the stranger should stay and eat with them. They wanted to hear more.

I think I have sympathy with the disciples. When I think about the present situation, I too am bewildered. When I watch the press conferences and hear the statistics of how many have contracted the disease and how many have died from it, I am angry and confused. I ask why? How? Could it have been prevented? Jesus listened to the disciples. He is listening to us now. Only through listening to him will we find answers. Then perhaps our lives will be changed. The fire within us will be rekindled. We will no longer take things for granted We will praise and thank God for all his gifts and learn to cherish them.

Lord Jesus, explain the scriptures to us, Make our hearts burn within us as you talk to us.

Lord watch over us and bring us safely through this crisis. Grant a speedy recovery to those who are suffering and eternal rest to those who have died. Bless and reward all those who have valiantly worked to keep us safe; the doctors, nurses, carers and all the front-line workers. Help us to learn from this experience and be better prepared if there is another pandemic.

Regina Coeli: Pope prays for vocations and Covid sufferers

During his 'Regina Coeli', Pope Francis recalled Vocations Sunday and invites international cooperation to deal with coronavirus pandemic.

Courage to respond to God's call

He commented that this Day reminds us of what Jesus said, "that the field of the Kingdom of God requires much work, and we must pray to the Father to send labourers to work in His field." The Pope noted that "Christian existence is always a response to God's call, in any state of life." He also stressed that "priesthood and the consecrated life require courage and perseverance; and without prayer one cannot continue along this path."

"I invite everyone" said Pope Francis, "to ask the Lord for the gift of good labourers for His Kingdom, with hearts and hands open to His love.

Closeness during pandemic

During his words following the recitation of the Regina Coeli, the Pope again expressed his closeness to those who are suffering from Covid-19, and to those caring for people stricken by the virus at this time. Pope Francis also expressed his support for an international collaboration that is taking place with various initiatives to respond adequately and effectively to this serious crisis.

It is important, he said, "to bring together scientific capacities, in a transparent and impartial way, to find vaccines and treatments and to guarantee universal access to essential technologies that will enable every infected person, in every part of the world, to receive the necessary health care."

THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM TONY TOPPING "THE GOOD SHEPHERD"

At the start of lockdown, to keep my mind active, I decided to write down my thoughts, my reflections, on what was happening during this crisis. Drawing inspiration from the daily mass readings, I have managed to write five reflections, one a week but this week I had seemed to run out of inspiration, my mind was blank. But then, on Monday the feast of English Martyrs, I read a text from St. Matthew's gospel (10:19) telling me not to worry, the Spirit would tell me what to say. I decided to just scribble whatever thoughts came into my mind. The following is the result. I hope it is acceptable.

At the beginning of WW2, Winston Churchill promised nothing but "blood, toil, sweat and tears" but he inspired the country to fight them on 'the beeches- we shall never surrender'. In the present crisis, the government has promised difficulty and hardship but has urged us to stand together and help each other for we are all in this together, we are not alone.

It is true, we are not alone. Sunday was Good Shepherd Sunday. In the Old Testament, God is referred to as the shepherd of his people. Jesus is the Son of God and he himself claimed to be the Good Shepherd. Saturday was the feast of St. Athanasius, who attended the Council of Nicea and, as bishop of Alexandria, fought vehemently and ceaselessly against Arianism. For me, if Jesus was not wholly God, he could not have redeemed us for only one who is consubstantial with God the Father, creator of all things, could wipe away our sins and only one who is wholly man could atone for the iniquity of mankind. I believe that Jesus is the Christ, both God and man. He said, "I, the light, have come into the world, so that whoever believes in me need not stay in the dark" (John 12:44-50). Jesus is the light of the world, not a created light but one which is divine.

During this Corona tragedy, there are people who want to personally gain from the crisis and are working in the dark to prey on the weakest and most vulnerable but the light has shone brightly on those who are valiantly and courageously putting themselves forward to help those who are suffering. There is so much love and appreciation shown by all good people; all the ordinary people who are showing so much care for their neighbours. When Betty and I go for a short walk around the block for exercise, those we meet give us a wide berth, not to show contempt for us but to show us love and respect. When those who are taking advantage of the weather by working in their gardens, when they see us, they smile and say hello. People are so much more friendly. Family members are so much closer and supportive of one another. I am moved when I see on the news the stories of good people who are making isolation more bearable for the lonely and the needy. We are not alone! The good shepherd never takes his eyes off us.

Stay with us, and then we shall begin to shine as You shine: so to shine as to be a light to others. The light, O Jesus, will be all from You, none of it will be ours, it will be You who shines through us upon others. O let us thus praise You, in the way which You love best, by shining on all those around us (St. John Henry Newman).

Over the last few weeks, the Catholic Bishops of England's and Wales have written to the Prime Minister requesting for our churches be opened for the Sacraments. If the answer no, then a further request was added, that the churches be open for private prayer while all the safety guidelines would be implemented.

"Cardinal Vincent Nichols spoke to presenter Justin Webb on BBC Radio 4's Today programme on 14th May about how Catholic Churches can be safely re-opened for private prayer as the UK government eases its lockdown restrictions to combat the spread of COVID-19.

Justin Webb (presenter's cue)

Is it right that you can go to a garden centre or to the council tip, but not to church? Faith leaders are meeting ministers on Friday to try and change this. Cardinal Vincent Nichols, the Archbishop of Westminster and President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales.

Cardinal Nichols

What we want to say (to ministers) is that the issue of how people are able to practice their faith are profound and are sensitive and we would like a bit more sensitivity from the government. And we would like to remind them that the Catholic Church certainly has put forward already detailed protocols, agreed with Public Health England about how we can start the process, step by step, of making churches available for people.

We want to do this for a couple of reasons, one is because they offer a private, quiet space for individual prayer and that helps people's inner stability, and also because the faiths are a terrific motivator for aspects of the service that are given in society today. Within a mile of here there are two Catholic institutions that feed 300 people every day and that is motivated, in a good part, by their faith.

Now, in these last weeks, we've been creative, we've been faithful. Mass has been celebrated every single day in Catholic churches. People have joined in online but there's something, a big, big feeling in the religious communities, of wanting to get back to a fuller practice of their faith, as long as we can do it safely.

What would it involve in practical terms?

Cardinal Nichols

Well, to begin with, I would like churches available for people to go and kneel and say their prayers, privately, individually. It would mean a routine of supervision; a routine of social distancing; a routine of cleansing. And all of that we believe we can do.

There's another thing it needs. It needs an understanding of what goes on in places of worship is quite different from one to another. So, a personal, individual prayer in a Catholic church is not something that is much done in Pentecostal churches, which tend to concentrate on big gatherings, and it's not what's done in mosques where people pray side by side. So we need a bit of differentiated thinking.

If I could use the analogy of sport... At the moment, it is okay to play tennis with your family, in a while it will be okay to have a kick around with your mates in the park. It will be quite a time before we can go to formal football matches. It's all sport, but we need to differentiate. We are talking about the practice of faith, but we also need to differentiate to make things safe – step by step.

You can see, can't you, why the government is so ill-equipped to do that in a sense. They don't want to get involved in one faith being allowed to do something that another isn't. But you are saying, if you are going to be literate about religion, you have to grasp the nettle, if i can mix up all sorts of metaphors."

Cardinal Nichols

Yes and probably be stung a bit as well.

Justin Webb

Well, that's the point isn't it?

Cardinal Nichols

This is why the task-force that meets will bring together these perceptions and the religious literacy that is needed to take this forward. But I think it can be done. We have to do it in a very co-operative way, reflecting Lord Blunkett's comments. But we've got plans; we've got preparation and we know the depth of peoples' feeling and their need, so that they can live their faith well and safely. That's what we are looking for.

Justin Webb

It was that last point I was going to finish with if we may. What have you heard from people about the need that they feel in themselves physically to be in Catholic churches?"

Cardinal Nichols

The Catholic faith has a particular structure and pattern which is built around sacraments and sacraments are explicit moments in which we are contact with the Lord. People have been distanced from their sacraments. They have been able to follow Mass every day and hundreds of thousands of people have joined in online. But every single one of them wants to be able to receive Holy Communion.

It's a fast for us = it's quite a painful fast – and that's true for other faiths. I was talking to four Imams yesterday and they would say the same. Think of the patterns of Ramadan and the sacrifice of the Muslim community is making by never meeting outside their families during Ramadan, and at the end of the big feast.

So there is a great deal of deep spiritual sacrifice being made and, okay, we're willing, but we want to know that we are appreciated and the sensitivities are recognised and that we have these opportunities to open up – safely, step by step.

Cardinal Vincent Nichols thank you very much for speaking to us.

Reflection by Tony Topping

WHAT IS LOVE?

"Rivers do not drink their own water; Trees do not eat their own fruit. The sun does not shine on itself and flowers do not spread their fragrance for themselves. Living for others is a rule of nature. We are all born to help each other. No matter how difficult it is...Life is good when you are happy, but much better when others are happy because of you." Pope Francis.

On Monday, my sister sent me this quotation by Pope Francis. It helped me to make some sense of the jumbled thoughts that were crowding my mind over the weekend. What is love? St. John tells us that God is love but God is infinite, unfathomable, immeasurable and beyond human understanding, so how can we know what love really is? I love you! Only three little words but such a big statement. What do we mean when we say it? When we are young and we meet someone to whom we are attracted we say we are in love. We like being with him/her and we enjoy the feeling it gives us when we spend time with that person. But is it not a self-centred satisfying of our own desires? It may be the beginning of love but, at this stage, it is certainly not a perfect love.

In recent days, I have seen on television stories of women and men carers who continue to do what they do, despite the danger, not because of the money they earn, for they are grossly underpaid for what they do, but because they love the ones they take care of. Perhaps love is a giving of oneself. During these last few crisis months, there have been many who have courageously displayed unselfish and unconditional love.

God has given us all we have. He gave us life. He gave us water to drink, food to eat but most importantly, he gave us himself. Jesus, who was divine, did not cling to his divinity but humbled himself to be as we are. He was born in poverty and lived in humble obscurity until it was time to reveal himself.

He then, for us, allowed himself to be tortured, publicly humiliated and put to an agonising death. The night before he died, he prepared his disciples for all that was about to happen. He assured them that he would not leave them orphans but would send an advocate, a spirit of truth. Nowadays, when people hear the word spirit, they seem to think of ghosts and ghouls, vampires and zombies. The Holy Spirit is God; God is love and as St John tells us, "There is no fear in love, perfect love drives out fear. Fear has to do with punishment and so one who fears is not yet perfect in love." 1 Jn 4:16-19.

The young couple who fall in love, if their relationship develops, their love will grow into a giving relationship. They will learn to put the other's need before their own. As we get older, like our bodies, the passion of our youth seems to fade a little but not the love. Like good wine, with age, love matures and improves. I thank God, for He gave me a wife who has put up with me, loved and cherished me for the last fifty-nine years.

O Jesus, help me to learn to love, not for my own sake, but let me recognise you in all the young and old, the sick and the dying, the poor and the lonely and all who are in need. Help me to love you with a perfect love.

PREPARING TO EMERGE FROM LOCKDOWN

As we await an announcement regarding the re-opening of churches for private prayer, we have been asked by the Bishop's Conference to begin considering who in each of our parishes might be nominated to serve as a "COVID-19 Safety Lead" to help assist with the implementation of safety policies as our churches re-open.

It will be important to be conscious that parishioners who fall into a "risk category" could not be invited to volunteer for these roles. The risk categories include those aged 70+, pregnant women, and anyone with underlying health conditions. As part of this process, risk assessments will need to be drawn up and appropriate PPE purchased along with cleaning materials. The Diocesan Health and Safety Officer, Julie Tinsley, will return to work next week to begin drawing up guidance and advice which will be issued in due course.

At diocesan level, we have been able to secure some limited supplies of PPE (face masks, gloves, disposable aprons and hand sanitiser along with barrier tape and floor marking tape) which we will be seeking to increase in the coming weeks working with "churchmarketplace". However, this will be a good time to consider ways of securing more readily available supplies of domestic cleaning materials such as household disinfectant; disposable cloths, disposable or kitchen "rubber" gloves and disposable aprons. Hand sanitiser will also be needed which should be at least 65% alcohol in order to be effective.

RENEW THE FACE OF THE EARTH

Come o Holy Spirit, renew the face of the Earth

As I sit each day and watch the press conference from Downing St., I get the feeling that many feel the same frustration that I feel. Day after day, ministers repeat the same warnings, stay at home, stay alert, help the NHS, save lives. When will we be able to go out? When can we go back to work? When will we see our families again? When will life get back to some kind of normality? The impatience shows when the Question is asked, why did this happen? Could it have been prevented? Was the government prepared for it? Did they act as quickly as they should have? Did world governments co-operate with each other? How are we going to make sure that it won't happen again? We are all sitting at home watching and waiting and worrying.

When Adam tasted the forbidden fruit, God promised to send a Christ, a redeemer. From then, the history of the chosen people in the Old Testament was a time of waiting for the one who would save the people of Israel. Jesus was the Christ who would save the world, but he was rejected and put to death. So, began, for the disciples, another time of watching and waiting and worrying. Jesus had promised to send an advocate to guide them. I can imagine how, like us now in lockdown, Mary and the disciples must have felt, gathered together in that upper room, frightened and frustrated, waiting and Questioning. They, too, were asking why did it happen. Why did God let it happen? Could they themselves have done anything to prevent it happening? On the day of Pentecost, the church is filled with joy. Strengthened with measureless hope, we pray to Christ, who is calling the church together in the Holy Spirit; - Lord, renew the face of the earth.

I thought you might like to see the video of what their parish has put together to celebrate the 5th anniversary of Laudato Si.





Letter of Archbishop John Wilson

27 May 2020

Dear Prime Minister

May I, first of all, say how pleased I was by your recovery from Covid-19, and also congratulate you and your fiancée on the birth of your son.

I write as the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Southwark, a Diocese which covers all the Greater London Boroughs south of the River Thames, the County of Kent, and the Medway Unitary Authority. The Diocese comprises 175 parishes and 169 schools, both primary and secondary. Our most recent statistics indicate that over 80,000 people attend church for Mass each Sunday and our outreach into local communities is considerable.

Since the Government's decision, on 23 March 2020, to close places of worship our churches have remained shut. We accepted this as part of the important strategic effort to save lives and contain the spread of Covid-19. Important Christian festivals during Holy Week and Easter all took place behind closed doors, each priest celebrating alone without a congregation.

As restrictions have been lifted, there is growing frustration that churches remain closed for private, individual, visits of prayer. This comes when restrictions on access to other 'non- essential' facilities are being relaxed. For Catholics, access to church buildings is spiritually essential, something recognised by other Governments internationally.

Respectfully, I believe that it is now time for churches to be allowed to open for individual visits for private prayer. Supervision and hygiene regimes can be put in place akin to those in supermarkets and any churches that cannot implement these would remain closed.

At stake here are two paramount principles. The first is freedom of religion and the second is basic equality and justice. Total church closure was justifiable in the initial weeks of the pandemic. However, to enable non-essential shops and services to open, while keeping churches closed for individual prayer, is an infringement of both religious freedom and equity.

I am not requesting special treatment for the Catholic Church. I appreciate that there is a Faith Task Force seeking to address the needs of religious groups and we are represented on this. There is, however, a growing sense of dissatisfaction. I ask that you please take seriously the needs of different religious traditions and, where their place of worship is necessary to their faith, you create parity of access consistent with that for retail outlets.

The long term mental health implications of Covid-19 are as yet unknown. Religious faith can help support people, both directly and indirectly, with respect to their wellbeing. Access to places of worship is integral to this.

I realise that you carry enormous responsibility at this time. I assure you of the desire of the Catholic Church to collaborate in ensuring our country recovers from Covid-19 in ways that are safe and secure. Respectfully, I ask, however, that you please act to enable those places of worship that desire to open, and are able to guarantee proper hygiene regimes, to be able to do so for individual visits for prayer. I receive letters and emails everyday asking for this, but the decision rests with you and I believe that it is now time to make this possible.

PREPARING TO EMERGE FROM LOCKDOWN - repeated from last week's newsletter

PEACE

Peace I leave you, my peace I give you.

There is so much unrest in our world; unrest and mistrust between East and West and between neighbouring countries which often leads to war; unrest between religions which often leads to resentment and violence; unrest in families which sometimes leads to separation and divorce. It is always the innocent, the children and the poor, who suffer the most. During the first half of this year, there has been a great deal of anxiety and apprehension brought about through fear of a detestable virus that has killed so many and has isolated us from our family and friends and has even forced us to find a new way of worshipping. Many have experienced a deterioration in their physical and mental health.

The above phrase will be familiar to all who attend mass for it is part of the prayer which follows the Lord's prayer. It is a prayer addressed to Our Lord Jesus Christ asking him for peace and unity in accordance with his will. Every time we pray the Our Father, we say "Thy will be done." These words are repeated countless times whenever we ask for God's help. Jesus himself, in the Garden of Gethsemane, prayed to his father that the chalice be taken from him but he ended his prayer with the words," not mine but Thy will be done." He surrendered himself to the will of his father.

Jesus bequeathed to the apostles and to us the gift of peace but not a peace that would banish suffering and persecution, trial and tribulation. It is a peace deep within us. A surrendering of our will to the will of God. St Alphonsus Liguori called it a conformity to the will of God. I know it is easy for me to say, me who has had such an easy life and never had to experience severe pain as others have, yet even so, it is hard for me to put into practice that renouncing of my own will and surrendering to God's. There are so many worldly things that tie us down and prevent us from soaring to that great height which will truly set us free. Each morning when I awake, I thank God for this new day and offer it up to him in thanksgiving and in reparation for my sins. Perhaps because of my age, I feel genuinely grateful and contrite, but as the day goes on there are so many distractions and I am week, worldly things occupy my mind and I have to consciously turn my thoughts back to God. I think about the holy martyrs who suffered persecution, torture and death yet went to the scaffold singing praise to God. They were able to do so because of the faith and inner peace that Christ had bequeathed. I remind myself of the words from the morning prayers:

As the new day begins let us praise Christ, in whom is the fullness of grace and the Spirit of God.

We praise you Lord and we thank you for all your blessings

Give us peace of mind and generosity of heart, grant us health and strength to do your will.

May your love be with us during the day, guide us in our work.

View from a teacher: Last week saw us begin the next stage of our Covid preparation for our Wirral primary school; namely the increase of number of children spending their day in school; the numbers increased from our steady 20 each day during full lockdown, to 70 last week with next week's numbers expected to surpass 140.

Like many teachers, since the beginning of lockdown, I have been busy providing on-line lessons for my own class, childcare for the children of key workers and providing telephone support to parents overwhelmed with the enormity of home schooling for the first time and not knowing where to turn. I have been amazed by the warmth and support of our parents, who despite their obvious concerns have shown immense trust

in their children's school during this period. The coronavirus pandemic has forced teachers to operate completely out of their comfort zone and has caused me personally to reflect on the importance and relevance of the relationships we build up over the course of a school year.

We begin the academic year in September, eager to make a good impression with our children and parents; we make a point of engaging parents to ensure we have their trust and support; we take time to find out about our children's hobbies, interests and family lives, all of which help us to connect with the children in our care and all this before they are taught a thing! We work hard in developing the wellbeing and social and emotional provision for each child, only to see the fruits of our efforts brought to a happy completion in July.

As we near the culmination of what has been a highly unique academic year, I am reminded of the first letter of St Peter, which highlights to me, particularly at this time, the importance of good relationships and why the efforts of teachers should not be taken lightly. "Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, watching over them—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock."



THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

Sunday was the feast of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, previously known as Corpus Christi. It was also my birthday. My sister said what a wonderful day it was to celebrate a birthday and so it was but it was tinged with a little sadness for it was the day that my great-granddaughter was meant to have her first Holy Communion. Of course, with lockdown, it had to be postponed, Still, we had a very joyful weekend with staggered visits from family groups, we followed all the distancing rules which was strange and very hard, and lots of phone calls and messages for which I am very grateful. Virtual hugs and kisses are not the same though. It is difficult for two- and three-year olds to understand why they cannot give Nana Betty and "Pops" big hugs.

The feast brought back a lot of memories for me. In his homily on Sunday, Fr Edmund said he has kept a record of every mass he has said since his ordination, where it was said, with whom and for what intension. I presume he must keep a daily diary. For the last thirty or so years, I have served as an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion. It has been a wonderful ministry giving me the privilege of taking communion to many people who were ill or nearing the end of their lives. All became very dear friends. I wish I had kept a record of all the people I have taken communion to. My memory does not serve me well these days and I cannot now remember all of them. My most recent one was Ellie, a real character and a true Liverpudlian. I visited her every Sunday, except when I was on holiday, for about twenty years. She was a hundred and two years of age and as bright as a button. She was spared lockdown for she died a few weeks before it started. It was a blessing for her for I think it would have been a terrible ordeal for her but I miss her a lot. Those I visited were always very grateful. They didn't realise what a great privilege and a joy it was for me. They truly inspired me and helped to deepen my faith. I hope they are all praying for me now.

Tomorrow, Friday, is the feast of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. In the house where I grew up, there was a statue of The Sacred Heart. It sat on the landing at the top of the stairs. It could be seen from the front door as you stepped into the hall. My parents had a great devotion to The Sacred Heart for one of the promises of displaying the image was that the family would stay close. All my siblings and most of their families live in our local vicinity. So, I have much to thank God for.

Christ be near at either hand, Christ behind, before me stand Christ be with me where e'er I go, Christ around, above, below

Christ be in my heart and mind, Christ within my soul enshrined. Christ control my wayward heart; Christ abide and ne'er depart.

CHURCH OPEN FOR PRIVATE PRAYER

What do you mean by 'private prayer'?

Individuals may come to church to pray. Mass and Confessions will still not be available in church. There will be a 15 minute time limit on a person's time in church if there is a queue outside, to enable as many people as possible, the chance to come and pray.

Can I come with my friend or family?

People from the same family or household may come together and sit next to each other. If you are not from the same household, you must sit separately, observing the 2m social distancing rule. Seats will be shown to you by the Stewards.

Can I just turn up at church?

Yes, but there will be set times and days church is open. At the moment Monday, Thursday and Saturday afternoon. 1.30pm – 2.30pm.

You may have to queue outside, as the Diocese has advised that a maximum of 10 people (excluding stewards) are to be allowed in at any one time.

Do I need to wear a mask or gloves?

It is entirely up to you! The Diocese **have not stipulated** that visitors must wear any PPE. Please be reassured that all surfaces (handles, kneelers, seats etc) will be thoroughly cleaned at the beginning and at the end of each 1.0 hour prayer session, with appropriate cleaning materials.

Visitors will be asked to wipe down the seat and handrail they have used with wipes provided and adhere to the 2m social distancing rule whilst in church and follow the one-way system.

Visitors will also be asked to clean their hands using the hand sanitizer gel provided, on entering and leaving the church.

Will I be able to use the toilets whilst in church?

No, unfortunately access to all the facilities (toilets, kitchen etc) will be closed to the public.

Can I light a candle?

A limited number of votive candles will be available to light from a candle already alight. Please ensure that if someone is lighting a candle and you need to pass by them, that you maintain the 2m social distancing rule.

We are hoping that over the next couple of months, these rules will be able to be relaxed a little and more people will be able to come to church. We will keep you posted on any changes that we are made aware of.

Church Visiting Rules as of 22nd June 2020

We warmly welcome you to our church. To reduce the risk of spreading infection, please ensure that you take the time to read the following rules, when coming to pray in our church:

- * No more than 10 people are allowed inside the church (excluding Stewards) at any one time.
- * Each person is allowed a maximum of 15 minutes inside the church.
- * Hands should be sanitized on the way in and on the way out of church.
- * Please observe the one-way system in place, when entering and exiting the church.
 - * Votive candles may be lit from a candle already alight
- * Please note, that any statues or religious paintings etc. should NOT be touched.
 - * Please sit in the seat number allocated to you.
- * When you are ready to leave, please wipe down the seat and handrail with the wipe provided and dispose of in the bin
- * The normal social distancing rules apply at all times, when waiting outside and when inside the church. Please try to stay 2m/6ft away from another person.
 - * The toilet facilities are not available in church.

Thank you for your patience and understanding in this matter. Hopefully, these measures will enable our churches to open for prayer to everyone. If these rules are not adhered to, the church will be forced to close its doors once more. Please stay safe.

ROCK AND SAND

Grant us, Lord, a true knowledge of salvation, so that we may serve you faithfully, all the days of our life.

As I sit here in my office with my laptop in front of me and connect to the live stream mass from Shrewsbury Cathedral, recently, I have kept a pen and some paper handy in order to take a few notes of what Bishop Mark, or Father Edmund, has to say in his homily. I often find them inspiring. Of course, this is not something I can do when attending mass at church, I have to try to remember what the priest says. The other day, while speaking about Saint John the Baptist. The bishop mentioned Jansenism, comparing it to the present pandemic and said how the heresy had lasted for three centuries. I have to admit that my education is not good enough to fully understand it. I think it is about predestination and whether we ourselves have any input into our ultimate salvation. Later, I tried to google it but became even more confused. My faith is a very simple faith.

I cannot believe that our destiny is determined before we are even born. We do have a place in God's plan but we have a choice. We have free will. We may not know what God's plan for us is but we can choose to respond to his call and to whatever seems to be the path that he has put before us or we can choose to go our own way. When we sin, we are making a choice, we are not being forced into it although sometimes it might seem that we are. When we sin, we know we are doing wrong and we can choose to do the right thing although sometimes it is so hard to resist doing wrong. It is still our choice to make.

I was given a book written by Denis McBride called "Where does the Story of Jesus Begin". I have started reading it but have not yet read enough to comment on it, but on the back cover it asks, where does my own story begin? On reflection, I think it must start with my parents; the love they had for each other; their shared faith in God, in Jesus and his Holy Catholic Church. In my childhood, I absorbed that faith and devotion and although, at times during my life, I have questioned it, that faith has remained deep within me. As I have said many times, my faith is a simple one. If I have misquoted or misinterpreted what Bishop Mark said, I apologise to him and to those who read my reflection. I speak only the words that are in my heart and pray that they are what The Holy Spirit has put there. In this morning's gospel (Thursday), Matthew 7:21-29, Jesus talks about two houses, one built on rock and one built on sand. I pray that mine is built on rock.

The important thing is not to say beautiful words about God, but to do the will of the Father and so reveal God's will and his presence in the world. (From the app "Pray as you go".)

A MOMENT OF GREAT JOY We are about to embark on the next, decisive stage of our re-emergence from the state of national lockdown with the public celebration of Mass and the availability, at set times, of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

All is due to begin from Saturday 4th July however, I wish to stress that every parish must feel free to go safely and surely at its own pace.

The reports which you have shared with me of the joy that has marked the re-opening of church doors, came about thanks to all the hard work involved in the detailed preparation of some 60 of our churches to open for private prayer. I am very much aware of the pressure which the demands of COVID safety have brought. However, nothing can take away the joy of being able to assist many to return, in the weeks ahead, to Confession, Mass and Holy Communion. Amid the pressure of the many details of our compliance with standards of safety may we keep in sight the goal and great joy to be shared.

MESSAGE FROM THE METROPOLITAN ARCHBISHOPS

I attach a message of encouragement for this Sunday from Cardinal Nichols, together with Archbishops Longley, McMahon and Wilson on behalf of the bishops, which I would be grateful if you could share with your parishioners in every way you can. We are approaching a moment to be celebrated and also to be approached with care and caution. I think this is the note clearly sounded in the Archbishops' note to the Catholic faithful. SUNDAY AND HOLY DAY OBLIGATION The faithful continue to be dispensed in this national emergency from the obligation to attend Holy Mass on Sundays and Holy Days. We have not yet returned to a state of "normality" and there are parishioners who may remain shielded/isolated for many medical reasons. For this reason, I would want to encourage the livestreaming of Mass to be continued wherever possible and the encouragement of prayer in the home and acts of spiritual communion for those unable to attend Mass.

TWO GUIDANCE DOCUMENTS I always want to share the advice I have received and today I am pleased to share with you two documents issued this morning from the Bishops Conference. I should note that we are expecting more general guidance from the Government at some stage, however, the guidance prepared for the bishops takes into account the best advice and practice available. The guidance assumes that all the provisions for the safe re-opening of a church for private prayer have already been put in place. The documents place a great responsibility on us to ensure that the Mass and the Sacraments can be celebrated safely in the weeks and months ahead. I think it likely that we will receive additional guidance as new questions and issues inevitably arise:

- 1) Guidance for The Celebration of Mass In reading this document you will notice that a decision is to be made, which I entrust to each Parish Priest who will best know the local situation: Safe Numbers a) To remain with the two-metre social distancing within the church and the number agreed in your risk assessment.
- 2) To adopt the one metre plus social distancing provision and to consult with the Vicars General and Julie Tinsley our Health and Safety Officer to establish a new and significantly larger safe number for the church. The adoption of one metre plus will require the wearing of face masks for all who attend and the closure and cleaning of the church after every celebration of the Mass.
- a) It may be possible for you to consider an outdoor Mass with all the vagaries of an English summer this would allow one metre plus social distancing without the use of face masks and would significantly increase the numbers able to attend. The Altar would of course need to be covered and shielded from wind, rain and even sunshine!
- 4) Distribution of Holy Communion

The national guidance leaves us with two choices: a) To distribute Communion silently at the traditional time for Holy Communion and in the traditional place in the manner described in the first option using a kneeler or perhaps a small table to create the social distance required of us

b) **To distribute Holy Communion** silently at the end of Mass from an established point with a kneeler or table allowing the faithful to depart from Mass immediately after receiving Holy Communion I think you will see that there are no easy options and we will need to find our way forwards in a way that is both reverent and safe for the parishioners.

Readers

I think you will note the requirement of single use gloves and the possible need to adjust face masks for the purposes of reading. I would wish to add that according to your judgement, I am happy in these extraordinary circumstances for the clergy to read all of the Scripture readings at Mass.

How Do We Regulate Numbers?

I dearly wish I were able to offer you a readymade solution to this most difficult question. I fear that it will be a source of upset when people arrive to take part in Mass and are not able to attend for safety reasons. It is the stewards who will most often be faced with this situation and a very unpleasant dilemma. I would suggest a clear and compassionate notice be prepared to clearly indicate at the entrance, that the safe number of participants has now been reached and it would be necessary to either attend Mass in the grounds of the church or to return for a later Mass. It may help the stewards simply to be able to point to this notice when the church has reached capacity.

Some dioceses are considering an on-line prebooking of places in church or a ticket distribution, however, this does not overcome the difficulty when people or entire families arrive at the church door without prior booking. One means to help overcome this problem would be to increase the number of Sunday Masses celebrated. The simplification of the Liturgy should allow us to do this more easily. At the Cathedral, this will be the approach that I will propose. I would ask you to seriously consider whether this would be possible. As already mentioned, it may also be helpful to consider the possibility of an outdoor celebration of the Mass which allows a greater number to attend.

2) Guidance for Confession In my previous Ad Clerum, I outlined the benefits at this time of hearing Confessions out of doors. In the guidance received today, we can now envisage Confessions within the church with social distancing and hygiene requirements Diocese of Shrewsbury - Ad Clerum 20/26 June in place, either in the church itself or with extra conditions within a confessional where there is an enhanced physical divide between priest and penitent. I commend all the advice to you in the light of your local circumstances. However, this is the time for us to begin announcing and making provision for the return of many to the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

FUNERAL MASSES

I want to note that from 4th July, following the safety requirements for Mass, it will be possible to celebrate Requiem Masses once more. Again, I leave the judgment as to whether this is possible to the local Parish Priest.

FURTHER GUIDANCE

We might expect further guidance in the weeks to come on the pastoral care of the sick. I would want to record all of our thanks to Canon Chris Thomas, the General Secretary of the Bishops Conference, who has done such outstanding work in helping co-ordinate our response to this public health emergency. I have certainly been grateful for his availability to assist the bishops and dioceses through every difficult day of this crisis. FOR TODAY ... I think the documents attached will be sufficient for today! I hope you will be able to ponder the content over the weekend and then consider the next steps in the coming week. I am sure there will be many questions arising which I will do my best to address. Be assured of my understanding of the difficulties and complexities involved in taking these next positive steps forward in the parishes. With remembrance in my prayer and with my gratitude,
