Thank you to all who have sent information for this Mouthpeace. It is good to learn of the varied activities going on in our area. As well as the events to attend in person, there are also suggestions for things we can do at home or in our local group without too much travelling.

The conference at Swanwick this year with its focus on the Sustainable Development Goals showed us that for those who care about justice and peace there is much we could do. We all see



the suffering resulting from climate change in different parts of our world; we all witness the outrages of war and watch the flows of migrants and refugees. We are all aware of the extreme poverty that so many people struggle with each day. But at the conference we were also reminded that individually we cannot take up all the issues.

We each seem to be given special concerns about which we care and on which we feel we should focus. Maybe these could be a few or even just one thing we can cope with. Fortunately these will be different for each of us. It is then helpful to remember the words of St Oscar Romero "We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realising that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well." "Let Justice and Peace Flow" is the theme chosen for this year. The prophet Amos cries out, "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a neverfailing stream!" (Amos 5: 24.) "A mighty river" is the symbol chosen to go with this theme, representing biodiversity at risk. The urgency grows and we must make visible peace with Earth and on Earth, at the same time that justice calls

us to repentance and a change of attitude and actions. When we join the river of justice and peace together with others, it creates hope instead of despair.and so we are called to take up climate and ecological justice, and to speak out with and for communities most impacted by climate injustice and the loss of biodiversity. Our prayers must call for justice not only for human beings, but for all creation. In covenant with peace, we are called to repent of our ecological sins and to change our attitudes.

Stephen Garsed, Environmental Justice Lead for Lancaster Diocese Faith and Justice Commission writes:

The Season of Creation is a worldwide ecumenical celebration of the generosity of God. The Season lasts from 1 September (World Day of Prayer for the Care of

Creation) until 4 October (Feast of St Francis). Pope Francis made it part of the calendar for the Catholic Church in 2015.

It is a time of hope and renewal, reminding us that the earth is the Lord's and that we are mere stewards, entrusted to care for it. It is a time to reflect on and appreciate the beauty of Creation and, in doing so, seek to protect it. Never has this been more important as today because every day, somewhere in the world, there are floods, fires and tropical storms, whilst the ravaging of the rainforests is but one symptom of what the Head of the UN describes, bluntly, as our "war on nature".

We live in one of the most beautiful parts of the world, so let's celebrate it. What better way than by having a "Creation Mass" one Sunday during the Season for, as Pope Francis says "It is in the Eucharist that all that has been created finds its greatest exaltation". The Season coincides with harvest-time, so it is a wonderful opportunity to decorate the church with the fruits of the harvest as a visible act of gratitude. In my own church we also brought out the crib figures to celebrate God's gift of his Son and the animal world. It was unseasonal, but it felt right.

On reflecting on last year's celebration I realised that something was missing. We had overlooked all the small organisms that are so critical to the healthy function of our ecosystems - the insects and the fungi that are being wiped out by our indiscriminate use of insecticides and fungicides around the world - we must celebrate them too! Then I thought, "don't children just love drawing spiders and creepy-crawlies and toadstools – not forgetting all the wonderful life in our oceans, such as octopuses and seahorses. Wouldn't it be great to decorate the church with children's artwork celebrating these wonderful examples of God's ingenuity?"

At the entrance procession one might bring to the altar: seeds, earth and water as a reminder of what is needed to produce the bread of life and in anticipation of the later offering of the gifts "Blessed are you Lord, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer...."

Let us draw particular attention to the references to Creation in our great profession of faith - the Nicene Creed: "I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible......through whom all things were made.......the Lord, the giver of life".

The theme for the 2023 Season is "Let Justice and Peace Flow", reminding us that we cannot truly care for creation whilst there remains injustice and inequality in the world, so prayers of intercession, hymns and the homily might reflect both the celebration of creation and the need for justice. There are Collects appropriate to these themes; a Preface of Creation and the lovely Eucharistic Prayer IV, so plenty of ideas in the great repository for prayers for use at Mass. We have now held three "Creation Masses" in my parish. People leave church clearly uplifted. We pray that they also leave with a greater commitment to do what they can to love and care for our wonderful world.

Every two years, the global arms trade comes to London. DSEI, one of the world's largest arms fairs, returns to London's Docklands this September. This is where those who profit from war, repression and injustice do business. This is where we can stop them.

1,700+ arms companies plan to set up shop, marketing their lethal wares to an expected 36,000+ attendees from around the world.

Nothing is organised centrally by STAF (Stop the Arms Fair), but the resistance is strong because our network is strong. 109th WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES SEPTEMBER 24TH

The Church has been celebrating the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR) since 1914. It is always an occasion to express concern for different vulnerable people on the move; to pray for them as they face many challenges; and to increase awareness about the opportunities that migration offers.

This year Pope Francis has chosen as the title for his traditional Message, "Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay", with the intention of fostering renewed reflection on a right that has not yet been codified at the international level: the right not to have to migrate or, in other words, the right to be able to remain in

The fact that many persons are forced to migrate demands a careful consideration of the causes of contemporary migration. The right to remain is older, more deeply rooted and broader than the right to migrate. It includes the possibility of sharing in the common good, the right to live in dignity and to have access to sustainable development. All of these rights should be effectively guaranteed in the nations of origin through a real exercise of shared responsibility on the part of the international community.

NJPN Conference continued:

There was a stong focus on these SDGs at the Conference this year with the diagrams on the previous page posted around our area. There are 17 SDGs. Although numbered 1 to 17 these numbers are NOT in order of importance. The goals are integrated—they recognize that action in one area will affect outcomes in others, and that development must balance social, economic and environmental sustainability.



Some background: 2015 was a very significant year On June 18th Pope Francis published Laudato Si' his letter addressed not just to Catholics or to Christians or even people of faith but to everyone throughout the world.

On **September 25th the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)were adopted by the UN Assembly**. 193 nations inclusing UK signed up to them. They are a universal call to action to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that by 2030 all people enjoy peace and prosperity.

December 12th The Paris Climate Agreement was adopted by the UN Climate Change Conference (COP21) in Paris at its 21st session. 196 Parties signed this legally binding international treaty on climate change. It entered into force on 4 November 2016. Its overarching goal is to hold "the increase in the global average temperature to well below 2°C above pre-industrial levels" and pursue efforts "to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels."

Almost eight years have passed since the international community agreed to take bold and transformative steps to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Yet, only about 12% of SDGs are on track to be achieved by 2030. **The International UN SDG Summit, in September 18-19 2023 in New York**, must mobilise the political commitment and breakthroughs our world desperately needs. <u>https://www.un.org/en/conferences/SDGSummit2023</u> The NJPN conference showed how people of faith can support that process.

The three main speakers gave us their insights into the SDGs as a whole and the workshops allowed us to concentrate on one or two goals more specifically.

On the Friday evening **Brian O'Toole**, Director of the Presentation Sisters Justice Desk for Ireland and England gave a introduction to the goals. He described them as ambitious, a collective agenda which was universal, applying to everyone and strong on working to end poverty. They offered a human rights framework, addressing such issues as women and children, care of creation and indigenous peoples.

Christine Allen, Director of CAFOD, on Saturday morning did a Q & A session with Columban Education Worker James Trewby. They focused on the hope the SDGs could offer to the poorer people of our world. Christine reminded us that the strap line in 2015 was 'Leave nobody behind' and yet this seemed to be forgotten by the world leaders today. We need an integrated approach as Pope Francis writes in 'Laudato Si' as everything is connected. That is not to say that we can do everything about everything, but that our analysis and our understanding has to take that wider perspective so we can clearly see what our particular contribution is.

Christine described the CAFOD strategy 'Our Common Home' launched in April 2020 for staff and volunteeers offering a vision for the 10 years till 2030. In our dealing with differing partners and their communities Christine suggested we must recognise that 'the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor' are equally important. It is our responsibility to speak out amplifying the voices of local people. To be able to do this we need to listen first and learn - this is about 'Doing-Together', not 'Doing-To'. We may need to change ourselves, be converted to working and living in a different way. Read about this <u>https://cafod.org.uk/about-us/how-we-work/our-common-home-vision</u>. The third speaker **Sir John Battle was an MP fo Leeds West** for many years. He is currently chair of Leeds Diocese J & P Commission and active in the local community anti -poverty campaigns in Leeds. He talked of the present challenge of simplistic misinformation by being told that we are winning on climate change issues. This is the organised and powerful lobbying against green issues. Politics is reduced to short term decisions in which present preformance matter rather than principles. Politicians like to give the illusion of competance. Activism between elections is used as a word of abuse and there is a clamp down on protest. Democracy is treated as if it begins and ends at the ballot box. Sir John urged us to speak up, to undertake sustained advocacy working on behalf of the poor to change structures. On a practical level:

MPs used to get a few thousand letters , now they get up to 3,000 emails within the same time span from various causes. One hand written letter can make much more impact.

Do research to find out where change needs to take place It is often whom you know that is important. Who has the power in your neighbourhood? Contact them

Craft a simple message and use stories to illustrate it.

Tell the truth and fight misinformation and falsehood.

On Sunday morning in small groups there was a 'What can we do?' session. Some of the commitments were lobbying politicians and leaders in general, involving the Bishops' Conference, to remind the UK government of its promises in terms of the SDG goals. "No new oil, coal and gas" was another call

encouraging indivuals and groups to disinvest and a promise to live more simply as individuals and in our communities and make sure 'nobody is left behind'.

GREENSTOCK IN STOCKPORT

On a sunny Saturday at the end of July Woodbank Park near the centre of Stockport welcomed GREENSTOCK. This took place in the Community Food Hub run by the Kindling Trust*. This was planned as a fun day for all ages with a chance to learn more about 'green issues' at the same time. It was organised by Liz Atherton, Project Manager of Climate Action Now Stockport Council, and her team of paid workers and volunteers from the Stockport Green Network. Some of you J & P regulars will notice Liz's surname and it was a joy to meet Steve and Ann Atherton who had come over from Liverpool for the day to support and help their daughter.



The following report was in 'ONE STOCKPORT' the Council's newsletter:

The event saw more than 300 visitors attend, with 50 others volunteering their time to help run the activities and stalls. Visitors took part in seed planting, learning about growing, playing carbon footprint games, making pedal powered smoothies, finding pre-loved items in a clothes swap shop, nature arts and crafts, and a silent disco.

In the orchard there were bug hunts, pond dipping for tadpoles and yoga under the trees. In the talks tent people heard about rewilding Stockport, the impact of consumerism, took part in a vegetarian Arabic cooking demo and were part of an important community conversation asking, 'how can we increase diversity in climate and environmental action here in Stockport?'

The Kindling Trust served up more than 200 portions of wood-fired pizza, dhal and cakes. Refreshments and activities were provided free of charge, a decision that the Green Network made so that everyone attending the event could participate

in the same way without worrying about money. There were no single use plastics offered and the Green Network thought carefully about how to reduce the amount of rubbish generated.

This is the first event that the Stockport Green Network has co-organised. Rebecca from the Conservation Volunteers said "It felt like a special thing to be part of. It was a nice venue with great facilities and hosts, it was really amazing. It was really positive to meet people in different volunteer groups, councillors, school workers and more."

Running the event has strengthened the group as a Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise (VCFSE) network, while opening up the network to new members and starting a buzz about what they can do next.

Jacqueline is a new member of the Green Network and said, "it was a lovely event and I enjoyed it very much, it is such a positive thing to be involved in, being with like-minded people and seeing visitors, especially children enjoying it was lovely."

SUNFLOWERS TO THE RESCUE

Marian Thompson writes: We all learnt in February 2022 (if we hadn't known before) that the sunflower is the national flower of Ukraine. But did you also know that sunflowers are the international symbol for nuclear disarmament?

In 1996, when Ukraine became a non-nuclear-weapon state, sunflowers were planted at a missile base in the country to celebrate this

monumental occasion. Since then, sunflowers have become a symbol of a world free of nuclear weapons, but that's not all there is to the story.

It has been discovered that planting sunflowers after a nuclear accident may help clean up the contaminated areas, given the appropriate conditions. Following the meltdown at the Chernobyl Power Plant in Ukraine, which released over 100 radioactive elements into the environment, sunflowers were planted in droves to pull out the radioactive isotopes from the fallout-impacted sites – an approach based on the principle of phytoremediation, which employs the use of plants to cleanse the environment.

Sunflowers have the ability to soak up exceedingly large amounts of toxic elements in their tissues, like 137Cs and 90Sr, which were found in the radioactively contaminated sites (soil and ponds) around the power plant. Owing to this enhanced ability of metal uptake, sunflowers are called hyperaccumulators.

Sunflowers are proficient in root-to-shoot translocation of contaminants, i.e., the absorbed radioactive contaminants are concentrated in the plant's biomass, and are converted into carbon-based forms. The harvestable biomass of the grow up sunflowers can be disposed of via pyrolysis, a process in which the organic carbon in the plant is burnt, leaving behind radioactive waste. The radioactive waste can be converted into glass by vitrification to be stored safely underground.

There is always a chance of hyperaccumulator plants being ingested by animals or birds, thus causing contamination to spread through the food chain. This is why, typically, sunflowers would be harvested before they start bearing seeds, as the aim is to harvest the biomass that contains the contaminants. Once flowering and seed-production are initiated, the plants do not grow much vegetatively (roots, stems and leaves are known as a plant's vegetative parts), i.e., the production of harvestable tissue to store the contaminants is much lower.

Nearer to home sunflowers are good for bees. As well as providing food, sunflower pollen is also medicine for bees. It helps to protect the domestic honey bees from a single celled parasite called Nosema apis. For this to be effective you need to sow the right cultivar of sunflower. There are now many varities on offer some of which to suit flower arrangers have had the ability to produce sticky pollen bred out of them. Avoid these and stick to the pollen rich cultivars such as Lemon Queen if you want to help the bees.
