It was a wonderful occasion that involved 116 MV/YSVP members plus staff, SVP guests and parishioners. Reverend Fr Martin Onuoha officiated assisted by Rev Moses and William. Fr Martin's homily was positive and celebratory, and stressed the importance of every act of kindness.

The Mass started with a procession of school banners to accompany the clergy to the altar. The children read beautifully and were a credit to their schools/college and to the Society, its youth programmes and mission. Their singing was wonderful, accompanied by a guitarist from the parish and from Aquinas 6F College.

After Mass, Aquinas College Chaplain, Laeticia and her wonderful YSVP students led activities. They gave it their all! It was a lovely fun way to end the day together with lots of laughter and sharing.

Thank you to all who attended especially students and staff from Aquinas 6F College, and St Benedict's, St Bernadette's, Cheadle Juniors, St James', Our Lady's, St Philip's, and St Mary's Primary Schools.











Chaplain Laeticia reported, "Our Youth SVP started this academic year with renewed zeal after a fantastic journey last academic year. We have welcomed enthusiastic new joiners from both year groups and together we continue to live out the Gospel and follow the mantra See - Think - Act.

- SEE: Our members have again elected to continue supporting the homeless in our local community and to show love and compassion to isolated groups particularly the elderly and the disabled and also people from minority groups in society.
- THINK: We opted to support the homeless by generating funds through fundraising events in college, a coffee morning in Advent to celebrate Christmas with the elderly from care homes in our local community, a Christmas fair fundraising event during the season of advent, and a cultural day to celebrate diversity in our college and to show love to every member of our community regardless of their cultural background. We also worked collaboratively with our local adult SVP conference to celebrate the Feast of St Vincent Paul together with the Mini Vinnies from schools in our diocese.
- The way your youth SVP members interacted with the younger children was a joy to see and in a lot of ways was 'Faith in Action'."

• ACT: We had our first fundraising event, themed the "Halloween Fest" in October which raised over £180 through a bake sale, fancy dress contest and other activities. We have also participated in the joyful SVP Mass celebration with the Mini Vinnies on the 8th of November where our youth SVP stepped in to share their joy with our wonderful Mini Vinnies through great interactions and entertainment. Commenting on the impact of our Youth SVP on this event the SVP president for Stockport & Hyde District highlighted in his feedback: "The way your youth SVP members interacted with the younger children was a joy to see and in a lot of ways was 'Faith in Action'... Your support and help turned this event from being a good one into being a great one and everyone attending including the Clergy were suitably impressed!" In another comment, one of our students who volunteered to share his great musical talent at this event said: "I would just like to ask what it is you normally do in the SVP? I had a great time today so I'm considering joining."

We are currently actively preparing our next charity event, the most anticipated 'Cultural Day' which we hope, will be another opportunity for us to show compassion to those in need, giving others reasons to live and to hope, while living life to the full and celebrating our college diversity.

Mini Vinnies have been busy selling raffle tickets in school and giving up part of their weekend to support the charity on their stall in the Christmas markets.

Finally, during Advent they arranged for each class to take part in the Reverse Advent Calendar so that provisions can be collected for their local foodbank.





# SS Peter & Paul bring festive joy to New Brighton





During the lead up to Christmas, Mini Vinnies at SS Peter & Paul New Brighton raised money to buy pyjamas for children in refuges.

By selling sweets at their Halloween disco they raised enough money to buy 36 pairs of pyjamas. These were collected by the adult conference to deliver to the refuge.

The Mini Vinnies visited a local residential home to sing carols and delivered



handmade cards. They also delivered cards to local neighbours. Finally, they made and sold reindeer food to raise money for a group who provide play therapy for children in refugee camps.

#### St Mary's go all out!

Our Mini Vinnies at St Mary's Middlewich have been very active this year so far. They encouraged all pupils to bring in items for a Harvest Festival which were donated to the Middlewich Food Bank.

They raised money for Caritas by holding a toy sale and lastly, they involved the classes in creating poppies that were displayed around the school grounds in preparation for Remembrance Sunday.



#### **The SVP Prison Group**

Recycling Christmas cards has been a popular SVP project involving Mini Vinnies and Youth SVP groups. The SVP Prisons Group helps those in prison by helping the Prison Chaplains.

Recycled Christmas cards enable prisoners to hand a card to their families, particularly children when the families are making their pre-Christmas visits to the prisons.

This year recycled Christmas cards were delivered to Chaplains at the visiting centres at Berwyn (Wrexham) and Hindley (near Wigan) Prisons and other local prisons.

Vincentian Coordinators report that whilst recycling the cards the young people take the opportunity to talk about forgiveness and second chances.

### Hope and remembrance at Loreto Grammar

The Youth SVP group at Loreto Grammar School Altrincham wanted to support those in their school community who were suffering the loss of a loved one during the month of Remembrance.

Students from across the year groups helped Lay Chaplain Miss Egan to plan a special Mass of Hope and Remembrance which was optional to attend for all staff and students. YSVP came up with some great ideas to help attendees feel comforted,



including designing a 'comfort card' with a special message to hand out to all who came. Over 300 students came to the Mass and the YSVP groups learnt a lot about the importance of walking alongside people in need.

Later in the month they gathered lots of resources to create new Christmas cards for those in local prisons who may not have access to cards to send to their families this Christmas. This was an extremely popular event with nearly 50 students giving up their lunch time to create these special cards. Our Youth SVP talked about the importance of what they were doing and showed great maturity and empathy. Some were inspired to do more during Christmas and a small group of students organised a carol singalong at a local care home with one student playing the piano!

The Youth SVP at Loreto Grammar School are now busy planning for this year's Lenten appeal, "Make Poverty a Priority."

They had so much fun choosing the images, selecting the matching card and singing the Mini Vinnie song as over 100 cards were made. Everyone agreed that helping others gives them a





good feeling inside and makes them happy.

Youth SVP at All Hallows Catholic College, Macclesfield

This term the group have met several times and were involved in judging the Harvest Hampers which the entire college collected. Some of the hampers were given to the weekly collection run by the SVP at St Benedict's RC Church, Handforth as well as to college families and local food banks.

YSVP also bought pens and stationery to contribute towards resources which the Year 12 and 13 students took to India in October. All Hallows has funded the running of a school and clinic in Varasanadu for 12 years, and the YSVP were happy to play their part.

The group wrote Christmas cards in collaboration with St Alban's RC Primary School. The card was designed in college by a student. The cards will be sent to those visited by SVP St Alban's RC Church, Macclesfield.

The Youth SVP helped gather and load the toys the entire college collected for the Caritas Toy Appeal. This is an appeal which All Hallows has participated in for many years, and the Youth SVP were happy to help.




#### Foodbank Saviours!

They were very keen to visit a care home so a group of us met one Friday lunchtime and decided on a plan of action." She describes their first actions, "On 13th December a group walked to Vale Court Care Home in Ellesmere Port and what a wonderful afternoon we had!! We sang Christmas Carols with the residents and some of our younger students performed a song from 'Matilda' that had been their school show in the summer. George played 'Happy Birthday' on the trumpet for David, one of the

residents whose birthday it was, and he cried with tears of joy. After the singing we had cakes and distributed Christmas cards that the Year 8 students had made. The residents were really pleased with the cards. Everyone involved had a great time and we have even been invited back! We are hoping to go and sing some Irish Songs around St Patrick's Day.

During Advent we have also been collecting food and making hampers for our adult SVP to support families in our local parishes. I am sure they will brighten up the day for some families and make a difference over the holiday period.

It has been a privilege to work with these young people who are ready and willing to share the Gospel values in their everyday lives."

Today we delivered the last car full of shoes boxes to One Project for their shoebox appeal. They will begin their journey to Ukraine next week.

#### St Patrick's welcomes Shropshire MP

They had prepared excellent questions around local and national issues that concerned them, such as

- My parents have a shop and everything is going up, but they do not want to ask their customers for more. What is the Government doing about this?
- What is the Government doing about sewage in our rivers?
- What is the Government doing about keeping us safe on the streets?
- What is the Government doing about the poor people overseas?
- What is the Government doing about the increases in energy cost?
- · What is your biggest achievement as an MP?

Bernadette, a local YVDO, reported that the children were terrific. They were confident and engaged.

Mini Vinnies also presented a cheque for £157.00 to train a teacher and to educate children in India, and to support the Sudan SVP Baby Feeding Station. Money had been raised from a MUFTI DAY.

These busy Mini Vinnies also served teas and coffee at their coffee morning for the elderly of the parish. They were assigned one to each table so were able to chat to the parishioners as they served refreshments. And, they have organised a food collection for their local foodbank!





#### St Alban's continue to support their community

The Mini Vinnies at St Alban's Wallasey have had a successful first 2 terms back in school.

#### They have:

- Helped restock the school's Foodbank shelves.
- Written letters to introduce themselves to residents at a local care home.
- Organised and advertised their own fundraiser in school: "CRAZY HAIR DAY", which raised over £150 for a local charity, Stick 'n' Step.
- Created 69 Christmas cards for prisoners to send to their loved ones.
- Created Christmas cards for residents in care homes.
- Took part in a reverse advent calendar,
   preparing 3 large boxes of food goods / art / toiletries for families in their school community.
- Made paper chains for the parish Christmas party.

They received an advent calendar and chocolate treats from the "older Vinnies" in their parish.





#### St Vincent's Altrincham

Mini Vinnie Trafford School's mass at St Hugh's Timperley: The Mini Vinnies were invited to attend the Trafford schools' Mini Vinnie Mass and took the tram to save on costs and always thinking about the environment. It was a wonderful introduction for the new Mini Vinnies to be welcomed into their new roles.

**Macmillan Coffee morning:** The ever busy Mini Vinnie group have kick-started the new school year by turning their concern into action. They hosted a very popular Macmillan coffee morning in September, raising over £500 for this invaluable charity.

**Month of the Rosary:** In October the group promoted and sold beautiful olive wood rosary beads from Bethlehem, to raise money for their chosen charity The Marist Trust, who support humanitarian work on behalf of displaced people, especially refugees and asylum seekers in Senegal.

**Befriending:** They have made a very strong connection with a local charity Cyril Flint Befriender. This may be someone who lives alone who has little or no contact from friends and family with limited community support. Knowing someone is popping in once a week can make a huge difference. The Mini Vinnies made Christmas cards, Easter cards, hosted a Bake-off challenge which raised over £500 for the charity and had a wonderful visit from Beryl who has benefited from this wonderful befriending service over the years.

Christmas: The Mini Vinnies spread their Christmas cheer in the community by singing carols, performing Irish dancing and playing instruments at their local Parish beneficiaries' Christmas lunch and also at

a local Rest home - Woodend. They also hosted their first ever Christmas stall at their school fair which was purely to raise money for a local Children's hospice Francis House. All the goods were handmade by the children.

November Remembrance Poppy Appeal: The Mini Vinnies made posters to promote and sell poppies and accessories to raise vital funds for this exceptional charity, which provides recovery and rehabilitation support to currently serving and ex-service personnel who are wounded, injured and sick.

**Harvest Appeal:** They collected donations for their Harvest festival and helped to deliver to Cornerstone Homeless shelter in Manchester and the local foodbank.



# St Mary's Youth SVP are non-stop this year!

St Mary's Wallasey YSVP group have been busy. They created a display for Remembrance Day for which the whole school wrote prayers and messages of "Thanks."

They also presented an Advent play and made and sold Christmas decorations. Money raised from these, and a Christmas raffle will provide funds for students to attend the Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes in the Summer term. They have also made food hampers and boxes of cheer to go out to the St Mary's community.

The group supported the churches in the community Nativity evening by leading the Nativity procession, serving drinks and mince pies, and supporting the College Carol Concert.

The YSVP group also took an active role in the whole school Mass as readers for the feast of the Immaculate Conception. A very busy half term.

#### St Luke's Action Plan

The Mini Vinnies at St Luke's Trench have lots of ideas to put their faith into action in school and in the local community.

An assembly was organised and led by the Mini Vinnies explaining the history of the SVP and a presentation on the key figures who inspired its development - members took their MV pledge and were presented with certificates

Within school Mini Vinnies have a rota to help the Reception children during lunch breaks - this involves helping children dress for outside play and organising play activities.

The group helped to prepare the church for Christmas which included decorating the Christmas tree. Mini Vinnies also volunteered for altar serving.

A class 'coin line' competition in support of a local charity called 'The Christmas Smile Project' was also organised by the Mini Vinnies. Children were asked to bring in coins (of any denomination) and the class with the longest line won. The funds raised were donated to the charity which works with local Social Services to ensure children in families they support have Christmas gifts.

In July, the Mini Vinnies also invited Conservative MP, Lucy Allan to meet with them to discuss issues that concerned them.

During Advent, the YSVP group had a wonderful opportunity to work with their local care home. They visited each week and enjoyed some festive fun.

The YSVP also took part in the SVP Prison project by recycling Christmas cards.






# A popular Vinnie Bear at St Mary of the Angels!
