I think I must have lived a very sheltered life or perhaps I have been blinkered and failed to see what was happening around me. There are so many bad things happening in the world today which, for most of my life, I could never have imagined; child grooming and abuse; people trafficking and the victims forced into slavery and prostitution; violence and hatred between, not only nations but also religions that worship the same God. There is so much greed and selfishness in the world yet most people at heart are good and generous but because there is something lacking in their lives, they turn to material things. They worship the gods of money, power, wealth and self-satisfaction. They feed the physical but neglect the spirit.

Our world, the planet we live on, is facing disaster. The scientists tell us that the point of no return is fast approaching. Surely it is time for all nations to put aside their differences and work together to save the planet. Surely all religions should do the same and pray together that God will save us. It is not God's fault that the world is facing such disaster. The scientists have proved that what is happening is our fault, it is because of what we have done. Only God can put it right. We must turn to him with sincere and contrite hearts and pray that he will listen.

I sat in church in my usual seat. The Blessed Sacrament was exposed on the alter and I quietly tried to become aware of Jesus' presence. My usual place is below a window which gives me more natural light and makes it easier to read my prayer book but I was not reading nor even saying prayers. I was just listening. My eyes were drawn upwards to look at the window. It is a beautiful stained-glass depiction of Mary and St. John. They are walking away from Calvary and St. John is supporting Mary who looks so stressed and overwhelmed with sorrow, she seems hardly able to stand upright.

They had stood for hours at the foot of the cross where Jesus hung in agony, his life slowly ebbing away. Before he died, he turned to Mary and said, "Behold your son" and to John, "behold your mother". Mary must have been truly heartbroken, not because Jesus had died for, she knew who he really was, the Son of God, but because of the cruel way the soldiers had tortured and humiliated him. He hadn't deserved this. He had never spoken against Caesar. In fact, Jesus had saved the life of one of the Roman centurions' family. Even Pilate could find no fault in him, but the mob, encouraged by the religious leaders, demanded his crucifixion. Jesus had done nothing but good. He healed the sick, gave sight to the blind, made the deaf hear and the lame walk and cast out evil spirits.
